This new Centre is a safe and friendly environment and offers support and services in several areas, such as family violence, sexual violence, addictions, mental health and more. The services can be offered via oneon-one support, workshops, group sessions and more.

- **MAWIOMI TREATMENT SERVICES** Support for Indigenous adults navigating challenges with drugs, alcohol and substance use disorders.
- **SACRED BUNDLES** Healing and Counselling Services for First Nations.

Listuguj's Laya Morrison is a student at Sugarloaf Senior High School and began dancing when she was around five years old. She was initially interested in fancy shawl dancing but quickly discovered her love for jingle dress dancing. She was inspired by her family and said, "I've always looked up to all of my Aunties, and I knew I wanted to be able to dance, have those teachings, and be a role model to the younger ones, as they are to me."

She taught herself the dance by watching others, paying attention to their foot work, body language and their steps. Morrison enjoys being around other dancers, the songs, and praying for those who need it. She said, "I'm very grateful for the opportunities and the memories I make along this journey of mine."

Morrison recently announced she will be offering classes to youth who would like to learn how to dance and learn more about their culture. There are two different classes for different age groups – ages 4-7 and 8-10. These classes will be offered at Alaqsite'w Gitpu School on weekends. Morrison is a big advocate for encouraging youth to learn how to dance and hopes that her classes can create dancing opportunities for others. Her advice to youth who are looking to learn jingle dress dancing is to never give up, carry themselves with confidence, and embrace the importance of developing their own unique style.

Morrison continues to dance at all powwows in the area. She was Jr. Head Dancer at this year's powwow at St. Mary's First Nation in Fredericton, NB. She is also incredibly grateful to be able to go on the powwow trail with her family, and for all their love and encouragement.



HOW TO IDENTIFY AN **OPIOID OVERDOSE** AND RESPOND WITH **NALOXONE**





RECOGNIZE AN OVERDOSE

- Unconscious/unresponsive no reaction to noise or touch
- Laboured, Snore-like breathing or absence of breathing
- Pinpoint pupils
- Bluish lips and nails
- Cold clammy skin



If someone is overdosing CALL 911 IMMEDIATELY

ADMINISTER NALOXONE (nasal spray)

The person seems to be unconscious

TRY MAKING THEM RESPOND TO SOUND OR PAIN

Yell their name loudly or rub the center of their chest (sternum) hard

They are unresponsive

CALL OR HAVE SOMEONE CALL

911

They are unresponsive

ADMINISTER A **DOSE** OF NALOXONE

F NE

2

GIVE 2 compressions

(5 cm deep) per second

OR CPR

They are unresponsive

PERFORM CHEST COMPRESSIONS IMMEDIATELY

They are unresponsive 3 min after administration

ADMINISTER ANOTHER DOSE OF NALOXONE IN THE OTHER NOSTRIL

REPEAT STEPS 4 AND 5

as long as the person is unresponsive

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Construction progress

The MU2 wind farm is taking shape day by day thanks to the extensive work that has been carried out on site since the beginning of the year 2025

New access roads

To date, 13 of the planned 15 kilometres of access roads have been completed, representing around 90% of the target. These roads are essential for the transportation of materials, access to the turbine sites and the smooth running of subsequent phases of the site.

Maintenance of existing roads

At the same time, maintenance work is continuing on existing roads on the site, starting in September on Lacroix Road, to the north of the site, to enable delivery of turbine components from route 132. This work will continue on Sainte-Florence Road. The aim is to ensure safe, suitable access for transporting large parts.

Wind turbine foundations

Eight of the wind farm's 19 foundations have been poured, representing around 40% of progress on this stage. Each foundation requires earthworks, reinforcement and high-precision concrete pouring to guarantee the stability of the future wind turbines.

Electrical substation

The main power transformer for the substation was delivered and accepted on site on September 30, 2025. This equipment will play an essential role in raising the voltage of the electricity generated by the wind turbines so that it can be fed into Hydro-Québec's transmission grid.







Underground collector system

Work on laying the underground cable network that will link the wind turbines to each other and to the substation is also progressing: 30 of the planned 48 kilometres of trenches have been installed, i.e. 60% of the total length. This network is crucial to the smooth operation of the wind farm, ensuring the collection and transmission of the energy generated.

্যাপ Noise monitoring

As part of an environmental monitoring and nuisance prevention program, a noise monitoring system was set up on site. Acoustic measuring devices were installed at three different locations to monitor, over defined periods of time, the noise levels generated by the various construction activities (wood clearing, construction of and road improvements, construction of the foundations and collector network, transportation of components and assembly of the wind turbines).

These measurements ensure that the construction site complies with regulatory thresholds and, if necessary, adapt the organization of the work to limit noise impact on the neighbourhood.

Community relations

Dialogue with local stakeholders remains a priority.

On September 17, 2025, the Liaison Committee visited the site. The meeting provided an opportunity to share progress reports, answer questions and maintain a transparent relationship with local stakeholders.



In addition, a project team took part in the National Day of Truth and Reconciliation on September 30, organized on the MU2 site. This moment of reflection and exchange reinforced our commitment to respectful and open relations with aboriginal communities.
